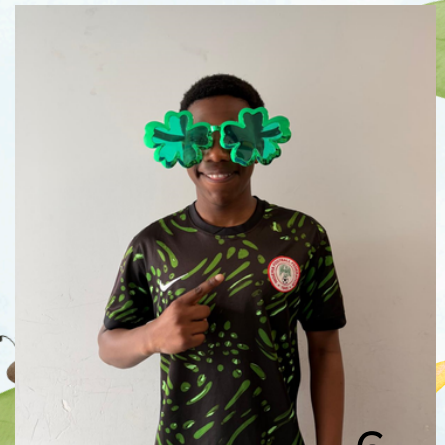

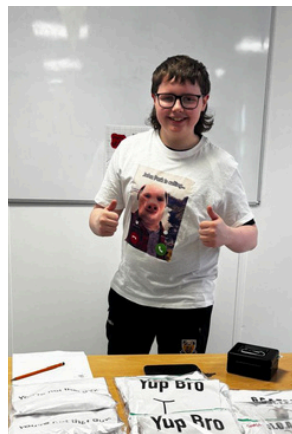

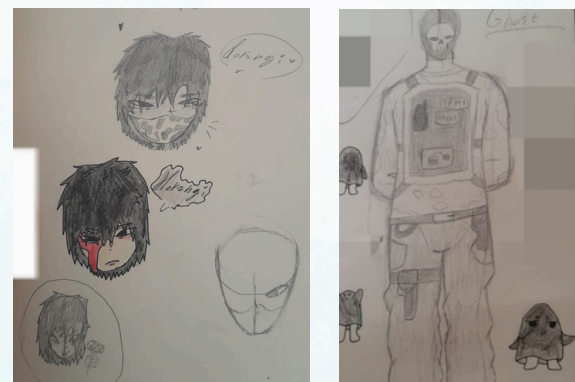

Plant Sale R25/R26 with our TY students 13th of May



The students of Room 25, Room 26 and Transition year community project have grown many varieties of seedlings, propagated houseplant cuttings, potted on and nurtured bedding and vegetable plants throughout the school year 25/26.

A plant sale will be held on the 13th of May 2026 from 10am-3pm. Included in this learning experience is literacy; reading signs, writing labels, making posters, numeracy; counting plants and calculating value, working with money in the sale. Communication skills; Promoting the sale and discussing the project. There is a cross curricular aspect involving Science, Art and Business.

Students following L2LP from mainstream are included in the preparation and final sale. Teachers, Parents, local people and the local primary school are invited to come buy plants. This is an active learning project with a focus on communication and well-being. Funds raised are used to improve and develop the sensory garden in the school and contribute to school trips for room 25 and 26.

Exam Preparation Guide for Junior and Leaving Cert Students

Junior Cycle

1. Make a realistic study timetable

Plan exactly what and when you will study. Break subjects into topics, assign them to specific times, include breaks, and rotate subjects.

2. Focus on understanding, not memorising

Make sure you truly understand topics. Explain them out loud, use examples, and test your understanding.

3. Use past exam papers properly

Practice under timed conditions, check marking schemes, and identify common question patterns.

4. Active recall beats rereading

Test yourself by writing what you remember, use flashcards, and regularly self-quiz.

5. Break study into manageable chunks

Divide topics into small sections, set clear goals, and track progress.

6. Take proper breaks

Study in blocks with short breaks. Avoid distractions and give your brain time to rest.

7. Practice writing full answers

Write complete exam-style answers and practice timing yourself.

8. Identify your weak areas early

Focus more on difficult topics and seek help when needed.

9. Create a good study environment

Use a quiet, tidy space with minimal distractions and keep materials ready.

10. Look after yourself

Sleep well, eat properly, stay hydrated, and exercise to keep your mind sharp.

Leaving Cert

1. Build a detailed study timetable

Create a weekly plan covering all subjects. Allocate more time to weaker areas and include regular revision sessions.

2. Understand marking schemes

Study marking schemes to learn how examiners award marks and structure your answers accordingly.

3. Practice past papers regularly

Use past exam papers under timed conditions to improve speed, accuracy, and familiarity with question styles.

4. Prioritise key topics

Focus on topics that appear frequently in exams and ensure you understand them well.

5. Use active recall techniques

Test yourself using flashcards, blurting, and practice questions instead of just rereading notes.

6. Write full answers under timed conditions

Practice essays and long questions to improve structure, clarity, and time management.

7. Target weak areas early

Identify topics you struggle with and spend extra time improving them with help if needed.

8. Stay organised

Keep notes, folders, and materials tidy so you can revise efficiently.

9. Maintain a healthy lifestyle

Get enough sleep, eat nutritious food, and take regular breaks to stay focused.

10. Be consistent and avoid cramming

Study a little each day rather than leaving everything until the last minute
