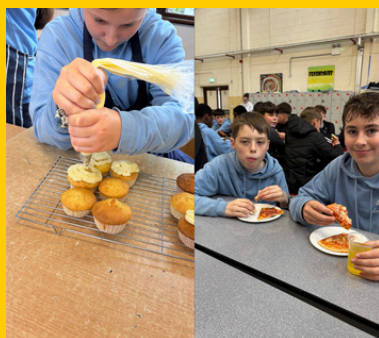


Wellbeing in Action

From the very first conversation, Branch Manager Jonny Duffy showed a genuine interest in the project and a real willingness to help. Numeracy



At St.Farnans' PP, numeracy is not confined to maths lessons—it is woven through every aspect of teaching and learning. We recognise that developing strong numeracy skills equips our students with the confidence and ability to solve problems, think critically, and engage fully with the world around them.

In the classroom, numeracy is integrated across a wide range of subjects. In science, students measure, estimate, and analyse data during experiments. In geography, they interpret graphs, scales, and maps. In physical education, they track scores, time activities, and explore patterns in movement. Even in literacy lessons, pupils engage with sequencing, patterns, and logical thinking. This cross-curricular approach ensures that numeracy is meaningful, relevant, and consistently reinforced.

We also place a strong emphasis on real-life applications. Pupils are encouraged to use numeracy in practical contexts such as budgeting, planning, and problem-solving tasks. By connecting learning to everyday experiences, we help students see the value and purpose of numeracy beyond the classroom.

Importantly, St.Farnans' staff strive to make numeracy enjoyable and engaging for our students through a variety of extracurricular activities across the school. Initiatives such as our games club, chess club, and maths club provide fun and interactive opportunities for pupils to develop their numerical and problem-solving skills in a relaxed and social setting. These activities help to foster a positive attitude towards numeracy and encourage participation from all students.

Our approach to numeracy is closely aligned with the DEIS (Delivering Equality of Opportunity in Schools) pillars. In particular, it supports:

- **Attainment:** By strengthening numeracy skills, we aim to improve overall academic outcomes and build a solid foundation for future learning.
- **Retention:** Engaging, practical numeracy activities—both in class and through extracurricular opportunities—help to maintain student interest and participation in school life.
- **Progression:** Developing confidence in numeracy supports students as they transition through different stages of education and into further learning or employment.

Exam Tips for Junior Cycle and Leaving Cert Students



Time Management

- Start studying early – a little each day is best
- Make a study timetable and stick to it
- Practice with past exam papers using real time limits
- In the exam:
 - Read all questions carefully first
 - Don't get stuck—move on and come back
 - Leave time at the end to check your answers

Exam Numbers and Organisation

- Learn your exam number – you'll use it on every paper
- Write it clearly at the start of each exam
- You must wear your FULL SCHOOL UNIFORM for each exam
- You will be assigned a seat on the first day, sit there each day
- Bring everything you need:
 - Pens, pencils, ruler, calculator (if needed)
 - Spare equipment just in case
 - Paper will be provided
- Arrive early (at least 20 minutes before each exam) so you're calm and ready
- Arrive before 9am on the first day - Wednesday June 3rd
- If for any reason you are delayed/late, please contact the school office immediately on 045-868152
- Use the bathroom before the exam
- Stay in the exam hall for the duration of the paper, if you leave you will NOT be allowed back in
 - Do not bring your mobile phone, smart watches, earphones or any books/copies/notes into the exam hall
 - If you do not have an exam, you do not have to be in school

Eating and Taking Care of Yourself

- Eat a healthy breakfast before each exam
- Don't skip meals—it affects focus
- Drink plenty of water
- Choose good snacks: fruit, nuts, yogurt
- Get a good night's sleep
- There will be no canteen available during the exams, bring your lunch and snacks
- Students can go to the village to buy food if they have an afternoon exam
- Bring a bottle of water into the exam hall.

Final Reminders

- Stay calm—you are more prepared than you think
- Don't compare yourself to others
- When an exam is finished, move on and focus on the next one
